Spring 2004 MAR Field Meet

Spring 2004 M.A.R. statistics: 135 people were in attendance. Three were people from as far north as Toronto, Canada and as far south as Virginia Beach. We had the good fortune to have a program presented by Keith Christenson who presented a program titled "*Bats, Bugs, Bones and Bootie: Caving in the Caribbean.*" This included a slide show and was very entertaining and well presented. A big thank you to Keith; every one I spoke to enjoyed the presentation, including myself.

There were many cave trips throughout the weekend. Some self led, some guided. The numbers I was able to record are as follows: Blacklog saw 28 visitors Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. A big thank you to Todd Hancock, his wife Linda, and Tim Long for their efforts to permit as many people to see the cave as humanly possible. They complimented every one on their cave manners, and added that the trails are a little more defined now. George and Karen Bange led 6 people through Rupert Cave. Garrett Czmor lead 15 people into Seawra Cave. Hipple Cave saw 21 visitors. My thanks to everyone's understanding and cooperation in allowing me to correct my oversight regarding some of the access rules that apply to Hipple that I failed to communicate on the sign up sheet. Had I not corrected these oversights it may well have damaged landowner relations which have at times been strained. I had stopped and talked to them regarding the increased traffic this particular weekend. Bluehole Cave saw 10 people and was led by Derek Flaig. Dave Bookhammer led 10 people through Kookan Cave. Jeff Morisay led 8 people through Ruth Cave. Joe Schock led 6 people through Milroy Cave.

The weather cooperated; overall the thunder storm that happened late Saturday afternoon had most people with any sense running out from under the tent which was on top of the hill and had several fifteen foot long aluminum poles pointing to the sky. Can everybody say lighting rods? I am thankful that no one was struck. Thanks go out to my good friend Amos Mincin who relieved me so I could eat at registration. Upon returning from my meal I inspected the registration log and saw an entry identified only as Jack I asked Amos who was Jack and where was the rest of his information. Treasurer Report: There have been no changes to the Treasurers Report from the February 2004 meeting.

PCC appreciates Dave putting work into the PCC website.

OLD BUSINESS:

PROJECT LIST:

Baker Caverns: Franklin, County, PA- No change in status or access; the property remains for sale.

Dragon Cave: Berks County, PA –Karen Bange reported for Mike Mostardi. There are new landowners and they are building a house on the cave property. Mike has spoken with the landowner who requests there be no caving. Mike will continue to monitor the situation but for the present time he asks that no cavers approach the landowner and the cave be taken off the project list.

J-4: Centre County, PA-status quo- CLOSED

Merkle Cave: Berks County, PA.- No change

Cleversburg Cave: Franklin County, PA.- Pat Minnick reported access remains the same while Franklin County Grotto works with the township. Once the new lock is put in place FCG will mail out keys to other grottos.

Additions to the Project List:
Corker Hill and Frustration Pit: Franklin County, PA- Amos Mincin reported that the landowner for these two caves changed in 2002 and the current landowner is a partnership that seems interested in developing the area. Amos proposed adopting this cave as a PCC project to 1) establish an access plan 2) survey and map the cave 3) and look into acquisition options such as a conservation easement, leasing the land or purchasing it. Since Franklin County Grotto is the closest grotto to the cave, FCG will discuss the idea at their upcoming grotto meeting and report back to the PCC.

Red Church Cave: Berks County, PA- Dean Snyder reported the current landowner, who does not like cavers, is getting up there in years. Apparently she has no heirs and is leaving her property to a conservancy or a college. Greater Allentown Grotto will monitor the situation.

Christmas Cards: Anyone wishing to add a landowner to the Christmas card list should contact Karen Bange.

Mail: Dean Snyder reported he received notice from the IRS that PCC is clear with their 501 (c) 3

NEW BUSINESS:

Juniata College Grotto: The NSS just officially acknowledged the newest grotto in

Pennsylvania- Juniata College Grotto in Huntingdon. This past spring Karen Bange invited the grotto to the spring MAR; several members did attend. Karen will invite the grotto to the fall MAR and to attend a PCC meeting.

Conservancy Forum: Amos Mincin attended The Northeast Cave Conservancy and West Virginia Cave Conservancy in Lewisburg, West Virginia April 15, 2004. The forum discussed standardized criteria, fundraising, management plans, stewardship with a focus on federal land management. 25 cave conservancies from all over the country were represented. Amos reported the guest speakers were all experts in their respective fields. There was lots of cooperation between the conservancies. Profits from the forum were distributed among the cave conservancies represented; PCC will be getting a portion of the profit.

NSS Convention: Dean Snyder will represent the PCC at the upcoming NSS Convention this summer.

Next meeting: The next meeting of the PCC will be on Sunday October 3, 2004 at the fall MAR field meet.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 am

NSS Preserves Name Change

As our commitment to future generations, the NSS owns or manages 13 properties to protect the caves that lie beneath them and their environments. We also strive to protect the complete habitat within its properties. For nearly 40 years, these lands have been designated "Cave Preserves." However, attitudes, perceptions, and business environments evolve, and the NSS evolves as well.

To emphasize the goal of the Society to protect the total environment of our Preserves, the NSS Board of Governors voted in March, 2004, to use the word "Nature" to describe its Preserves. Our

lands contain much more than caves, and our management plans include guidelines for conserving and protecting the surface resources in addition to those underground. The wealth of diverse flora and fauna and important watersheds on our lands enrich the fragile environment we protect underground. Through management plans, the Society endeavors to manage our Preserves to ensure the well being of their total environments, and the new "Nature Preserve" designation better reflects this. For example, we now have the Tytoona Cave Nature Preserve, the Wells Cave Nature Preserve, etc.

An additional factor: The NSS works with land trusts and other nature conservancy organizations, and we are beginning to apply to these organizations, foundations, and governments for grants to support our programs and projects. These groups understand, appreciate, and are used to dealing with "nature preserves." We believe that re-labeling our preserves will help emphasize to these groups that the NSS is a nature conservancy, albeit one in a special niche.

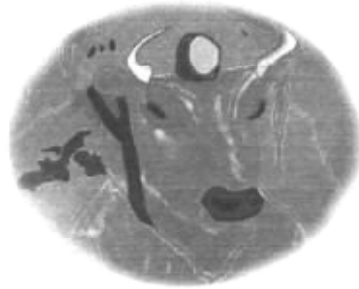
Furthermore, insurance companies better understand and are less fearful of "Nature Preserves" than a "cave preserve." The NSS had great difficulty renewing the Society's insurance policy, and last year incurred an additional \$17,000 expense to do so. This is a great financial strain. To maintain insurance coverage for the Society, for our properties, for our conventions, and for Internal Organizations (Grottos) who request a rider for their activities, we need to do what we can to be seen as the reasonable risk that we are. Perhaps being custodians of "nature" preserves will help us in this endeavor.

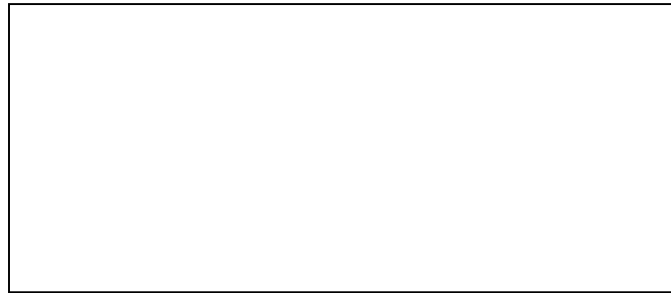
