A public hearing has been scheduled by the Environmental Quality Board to discuss the petition to designate the Hostemans's Pit area Unsuitable For Mining. The hearing will be held at the Penns Valley Area High School on April 27, 1993 at 7 p.m.

The Nittany Grotto will be representing the caving community. Interested cavers are encouraged to attend.

If you want to present oral testimony, you must register in advance. Written testimony will be accepted up to May 12, 1993.

[Ed. Con-Stone, Inc. has filed an application for a permit to surface mine limestone. The mine would destroy most of Hosterman's Pit.]

## Bernard L. Smeltzer (1930-1992) - A Tribute

I find it difficult to convey to you, in a limited article, what Bernie Smeltzer meant to me as a cave cartographer. Some of our abilities are God given, but many more are learned from those who come before us. Bernie was my teacher, but was I the only student? I believe his maps set the standards for so many to follow!

For those off you who missed the Salem, Indiana N.5.5. Gonvention, the program contained a description of a display which was dedicated to the accomplishments of Bernard L. Smeltzer, N.S.S. #1104. It read as follows.

A Pioneer is a person who originates or helps open up a new line of thought, new methods or ideas, trails blazed for others to follow. Bernie Smeltzer was a Pioneer. a leader in cave cartography. willingness to share his discoveries and pass on his talents, has opened the doors for so many other cave surveyors and cartographers. No caver from Pennsylvania has ever drawn a map of a cave without referring to a "Bernie Smeltzer" map for guidance. influences are evident in every cave map drawn today. Bernie was drawing "artistic" maps loaded with detail as early as the late 1940's and early 1950's. His maps not only contain accurate, surveyed accounts of cave passage, but Bernie considered each cave a project worthy of lengthy geologic description.

This exhibition is merely a fragment of Bernie's life as an artist, caver speleologist, geologist, archeologist, paleontologist, father, teacher and friend. For those of you who didn't know him, we hope to introduce you to Bernie and his contributions to our world of caving. For those who personally knew Bernie and caved with him, this exhibition is a tribute to a legend.

The end of a caving era has come. Our friend was taken too soon, this past May [1992], while hiking on a beautiful spring

day. We miss him dearly. Bernie Smeltzer was a humble man, he would be more than flattered with your interest in his life's accomplishments.

I used the term "Pioneer" because he has influenced the way we draw cave maps today. In 1954 when NSS Bulletin 15. Caves of Pennsylvania, was published, 92 of the 272 cave descriptions and 22 of the 44 cave maps were done by Bernie. [1] Early publications like these set cave mapping standards. Bernie's detailed cross-sections, profiles and notations are trademarks. He produced "caver maps". They were easy to read and draw with uncanny accuracy and detail. He drew cave location maps for each cave he explored and lengthy historic and geologic descriptions of each cave regardless of its length. Bernie used symbols and a legend as early as 1950. His maps would always proudly display the words "prepared by the National Speleological Society" or contain the NSS Symbol.

Cave scientists Dr. Ralph W. Stone and William Davies prior to Bernie's time drew very simple maps of caves. They relied on lengthy geological descriptions to document their caves. They made great achievements in speleological research, but there was very little emphasis on cartography. Bernie was the first to combine science, survey (engineering), and art. A marriage that is the essence of cartography. His science is in the crosssections. Dr. Will White (NSS #2237) can give an enduring geology lecture on a cave he has never visited if Bernie Smeltzer has mapped it! [2] Perhaps no other cave cartographer has better illustrated geology in cross-sections and profiles as well as Bernie. Especially as early as 1950!

Certainly there have been those who surveyed more caves or explored in more exotic locales. Bernard Smeltzer blazed the cartographic trail to Kentucky Avenue, Mammoth Cave and El Rectangulo, Costa Rica.

## The Bernard L. Smeltzer Award - A Proposal

Perhaps some of you have heard about my campaign to change the name of our most sought-after cartographic award "The Metal Award". I believe it is about time we direct more national attention to all those cavers participating in cave survey and cartography. What better way than to recognize the year's best with an honorary award?

I find it difficult to understand why there would be opposition to renaming an existing award, to memorialize a pioneer in the field of cave cartography. By naming the award for Bernie we are not proclaiming him the greatest cartographer ever, nor are we claiming him as a father of cartography. The Lew Bicking Award, for example, was established to honor Lew's achievements in the field of exploration. Many of the winners of this prestigious award could claim to more accomplishment than Lew Bicking himself. Bernie Srneltzer surveyed and mapped caves. The fact that he surveyed caves in Pennsylvania and not in Virginia or Mexico, or the fact that he didn't enter national contests does not make his maps less reputable.

Bernie received the NSS Certificate of Merit Award at the age of 23. (footnote 1) Bernie's first cave maps were drawn in 1949 and 1950, and he continued drawing maps until 1992. All of Bernie's 145 cave maps were published in NSS Bulletins, Region Reports or local grotto newsletters. I have read through boxes and boxes of beautifully hand written geology reports for every cave he explored. Paleo and historical research is also included for most of the caves. His life was dedicated to caves and cavers. exploration, science and research. He had a museum quality collection of bones, fossils and artifacts he collected from the southwestern U.S., Mexico and all over Pennsylvania. Perhaps his proudest work was the completion of a fully hand illustrated book for his son's Geologic Park in New York state.



Bernie cared so much about the young people in the grotto. He was always eager to run a field trip or listen to a new discovery or share one of his. He was a living legend to the cavers who knew him, and if you never heard of him it was because he was a humble man. This past February at an annual Mid-Appalachian Region meet, I asked Bernie to help me teach a survey seminar we were organizing. I told him what high regard I had for him, and how I wanted the best cartographers to teach at our seminar. I continued by explaining how his work had influenced mine and others. He simply said, "well thank you but you know, some of the maps I see today are so very good".

Bernie died before he could teach at that seminar, but he was there. I used his maps as examples of how to draw a working map, how to draw a cross-section, how to draw a location map, how to use a legend and how to compose a title block... and so on.

There were at least six maps entered in this year's cartography contest by Pennsylvania cavers. I know for a fact that Bert, Dotty, Walt, Jeff and I have been greatly influenced by Bernie Smeltzer. We will continue surveying caves and entering contests, regardless of what they call the award, but nothing would make me prouder than to see a deserving cartographer receive an award named for a true pioneer in cave cartography, Bernard L. Smeltzer.

## NSS Offered Durham Cave Property

International Paper Company, Inc. has offered to donate a piece of property containing Durham Cave to the NSS. The well-known cave, located along the Deleware River in Bucks County,

Pennsylvania, is important historically, archeologically, and paleontologically. The property also includes Durham Cave #2 which has been connected with the historic Durham Cave to make approximately 750 feet of passages.

Because of its location beside the river, the cave was known to be used by native Americans. Printed references to the cave, documenting a rich and varied history, began in 1770 and continue to the present day. Paleontological and archeological research in the cave has continued for the past 135 years. In the mid-19th century, much of the historic cave was quarried away exposing a 100-foot long, 40-foot wide, and 30-foot high room to daylight. This allows visitors to see a cave room without the need to get dirty or use lights.

In 1991, a teenager died after a fall from the 50-foot high quarry face above the entrance. The cliff is the major liability associated with the property.

A committee with members from four nearby grottos has been formed to draft a management plan for the property. The NSS Board of Governors will meet in the near future [April 17, 1993] to consider the offer and the plan. Preliminary indications are that the NSS will approve the acquisition.

## Minutes of 1992 Business Meeting

[Ed. note. The Minutes are summarized here to save space. The full text is available from any of the current officers.]

The meeting was called to order by Chair Jeanne Wetterling at 1:45 p.m. at the home of Jay Herbein on February 29, 1992. A total of 48 individuals attended representing 17 caving organizations from PA, MD, WV, DE, NJ, MA, and DC. All four officers were present. Jeanne Wetterling (chair), Keith Wheeland (vice chair), Bill Wolford (secretary), and Elizabeth White (treasurer).

Bert Ashbrook's minutes of the Feb. 23 1991 MAR Business Meeting were approved with the following corrections: At the bottom of page 3, "Richard" should be "Robert", as in Governor Robert Casey. Keith Wheeland's name was incorrectly spelled "Kieth" throughout the minutes.

The treasurers report was accepted. The balance stands at \$2,592.70.

Judi Stack of the PA Cave Law Legislative Task Force urged everyone to contact their state representative and ask them to support Senate Bill 1051, the Landowner Liability Act which limits liability to landowners who allow cavers to visit their caves.

Judi Stack reported that the slide show on the caves of Pennsylvania was completed in 1991. She has a copy and a copy has been sent to the NSS Library.

Larry Clauser, Chair of the Pennsylvania Cave Conservancy (PCC), reported that Cleversburg Sink should be under lock and key by spring. The Franklin County Grotto with help from York, GAG, and Pittsburgh Grottos constructed a gate at the smaller upper opening. The larger lower opening will be filled with large boulders and topped with dig-resistant fill. Grottos within the area were sent a letter explaining the project and providing details for obtaining a key. Franklin County Grotto has been assisted financially, however, additional donations are welcome.

Bert Ashbrook reported on the Cave Protection Sign Project. Fifty-five signs were produced. A \$500 grant was provided by The Robertson Association. MAR paid the remaining \$32.65. Additional funds will be requested from the Richmond Area Speleological Society. The signs will be sold for \$10 each, and a record of cave locations will be kept by Bert Ashbrook and Keith Wheeland.

Keith Wheeland reported that there are now 1179 caves in the database. Information from the database is provided on a need to know basis.

Bette White reported that MAR Bulletin 17, Caves of Northumberland County and Bulletin 18, Caves of Berks County were published in 1991. Will White proposed reprinting 50 copies of MAR Bulletins 1-4 in one publication with a new preface. After some discussion, the motion was passed. Approved was a motion to reprint individual copies of MAR Bulletins 5-9 using available extra maps and pages.

Dean Snyder and Rich Kranzel are working on the caves in Lebanon County and asked for comments concerning their idea to publish a bulletin containing the caves of the Susquehanna and the East Branch since there are few caves in individual counties in the area. They were encouraged to do so.

Bill Wolford announced that Pittsburgh and Loyalhanna Grottos were working on an MAR Bulletin to document the caves of Westmoreland County.

Bill Wolford reported on the Loyalhanna Grotto's effort to sucessfully prosecute cave vandals at Bear and Con Caves. The \$400 reward received by the Grotto will be used for cave conservation.

Loyalhanna Grotto is coordinating an effort to protect the caves of Chestnut Ridge from being destroyed by a proposed massive quarry operation. Approximately 20 caves could be affected. The list includes Bear, Con, and Copperhead.

Will White enlightened the group on the status of Hosterman's Pit which is also being threatened by a proposed quarry. The Nittany Grotto is leading the effort to protect the cave.

Will White reported that Aitkin Cave has been sold to The Nature Conservancy. The gate installed by the conservancy is working and the bat populations are increasing.

Keith Wheeland recommended a voluntary moratorium on winter caving at Sharers Cave because of the large bat population there. The matter was referred to the PCC.

The meeting was adjourned at 4 p.m.
