Earth Day Cleanup - Alexander Caverns

Rick Smith, of Bald Eagle Grotto, coordinated an Earth Day Cleanup at Alexander Caverns. The cleanup occurred on Saturday April 26th and was well attended by members of the Mid Appalachian Region and the Pennsylvania Cave Conservancy. The meet-up time was early, 8:30 am, so many cavers were on the road by 7 am. The turnout was impressive as the weather was dismal - pouring rain. At least it wasn't a cold rain. By 8:45 the 20 plus participants had arrived at the appointed truck stop in Milroy. The convoy of cavers then headed out from the truck stop to the cave.

A local landscape business, Wrays Landscaping, brought a trailer out to the cave. The trailer was used to collect the trash brought out from the sinkhole. Wrays Landscaping donated the trailer and hauling of the trash. Pennsylvania Cave Conservancy covered the cost of the disposal. Once the group was at the cleanup site, garbage bags were handed out, people donned heavy work gloves and got to work. Getting down into the sinkhole was a bit treacherous with the slick conditions. The first big item to be hauled out of the sinkhole was a chest freezer. Fortunately, Jesse Young's Jeep was outfitted with a winch. Boy, did that come in handy! The winch hauled the freezer up lickety-split!

The next big item to be hauled out of the sink hole was a 15-foot-long corrugated pipe. First the pipe had to be removed from the insurgence. Then the pipe was floated down Honey Creek to an area that the pipe could be hauled up out of Again, Jesse's winch the sinkhole. came to the rescue and the pipe was up the steep 20-foot bank to the road Once cleared quickly. embankment, the pipe was attached to the back of Jesse's Jeep and hauled back to the trash pickup area. landowner has plans to reuse the pipe.

As all this was going on, others canvased the sinkhole picking up trash that was scattered along the road and down the embankment. The final haul in the trailer was four tires, twelve bags of trash and the corrugated pipe.

The great accomplishment of the sinkhole cleanup was celebrated with complimentary pizza from Joe's OIP in Lewistown. Everyone enjoyed the well-earned pizza lunch. Thanks to Rick for coordinating such a successful cleanup. And a BIG thanks to all those who showed up on a rainy Saturday. Ironically, as the group was cleaning up the parking area after lunch, the rain stopped.

Alexander Cavern Writeup

(Editor's note: this is same cleanup event as the previous article, but from a different perspective. Also, another excellent example of a cave conservation report!)

Date: April 26, 2025 Time: 8:30am - 11:30am

General Attendance: Over 20 people

The day started out very wet with showers expected to remain throughout the morning. Everyone met up at the Rutters in Milroy at 8:30am. We had many people from Franklin, Greater Allentown, 7 Valleys, York

and Bald Eagle Grottos and also many representatives from MAR and PCC.

After everyone set up at Rutters, we all headed out to the site and parked along the road. Many people came prepared for the weather and three canopies were set up along the road, close to the sinkhole location.

Water was stationed at each canopy along with tools and gloves. Garbage bags were handed out and everyone got to work and started to collect garbage.

Wrays Landscaping arrived right on schedule at 9a with their 2-ton trailer. The person who delivered the truck also stayed to help and was amazed at the number of people who showed up.

Ryan Maurer assisted with setting up rigging for rope to help people not only get down into the sink but to also haul up garbage. Jesse Young assisted by setting up his Jeep with its winch and we were able to connect the ropes that Ryan had set up.

With the rigging setup and the winch in

working order, the hard work of hauling garbage commenced. Four tires were hauled out initially along with a chest freezer and a portion of a child plastic bed or possible toy chest. Bags of garbage flowed next with over 12 bags being passed up to the top of the sink.

At the top of the sink, more bags of garbage were collected and a half-decomposed couch was also loaded into the trailer.

During the cleanup, and with the permission of the Hostetler family, a couple of cavers went to the mouth of the cave and retrieved tires from the creek. At least 4 tires were pulled from the creek and 4 more were

located within the brush around the banks of the creek. It was then decided that due to the largeness of the tires we would leave them out of the watering and retrieve them at a later date.

Another group decided they would try to get a corrugated pipe out of the water that was deep in the mud. Many people got in the water and managed to wiggle the pipe out

and then also took the time to float it down the stream and clean the mud out of it. Jesse then used his Jeep winch to haul out the pipe from the water.

Once the pipe was placed for Henry, Hope arrived with pizza and soda from Joe's Original Italian Pizza. Everyone feasted and only about half a pizza was leftover which was scooped up and taken by less than hungry cavers.
